The Albuquerque Chinese American Film Festival is a project of our chapter to share with the wider community the struggles and the hopes and dreams Americans of Chinese descent have had to navigate through out their immigration to the US, included the 60 odd years of Chinese Exclusion from 1882 to 1943.

The 8th Annual Film Festival ran October 2024 and was an astounding success that was attended by members of the National Board. The Board Members mingled with the film makers and film subjects. Albuquerque Chapter Organizers and youth dance troupe were also given opportunities to meet with the National Board members in attendance. Thanks to the hard working committee chair, Paul Jew, film festival founder Siu Wong, and committee members Carolyn Chan, Rusty Chan, Vivienne Affat, Fay Yao, Karen Leong, Mamie Chan, Karol Chin, Marc Anthony Liu, who assembled the slate of films that were termed "the best ever."

Film makers Kenneth Eng and Brian Inecencio filmed additional interviews to ass to the Albuquerque Lodge footage to be included in the documentary about C.A.C.A. and all its 20 chapters.

The youth dance troupe performed at the festival for the board members, and Checks were presented to Sabina Cottrill and Alexis Limary for participating in the C.A.C.A national essay contest. Dr. Mamie Chan received the 2024 Spirit of New Mexico Award for her community service and teaching traditional Chinese Dance to the youth for more than 20 years.

As we know, we are products of our environment, and we cannot achieve our successes alone. I first want to thank my husband, Gord, who has been a stalwart supporter of me throughout our 34 year relationship. I could not be where I am today without him being the foundation for our family, and I am so very lucky to have a partner who gets it. But I also would not be who I am without my parents, Tony and Carolyn Chan, who weren't able to make it tonight because they are taking care of my brother Rusty who recently had a kidney transplant -- so I also want to take a second to also thank anyone who is an organ donor.

My parents grew up during the Great Depression in the Mississippi Delta, where racial disparity and poverty prevailed. The Chinese American children of the area were segregated to a oneroom, one-teacher schoolhouse for ages K-12. After school, the children worked in their family grocery stores (with their homes in the back of the store), helping with all aspects of the store seven days a week. After encouragement from an uncle, my father applied to optometry school, and thus began his life-changing path. Afterwards, in 1959, they headed to Albuquerque where my father became the first Asian American to hold an optometry license in New Mexico. The story goes that he failed the Boards in Nevada but passed Boards in New Mexico, so I am grateful every single day that they ended up in New Mexico instead of Nevada. My parents went on to give back to their community, working hard with civic, political, and professional organizations, where my dad became the first Asian American to serve on Board of Trustee for the American Optometric Association. Both of my parents continued to break barriers throughout their entire lifetime. Their story of humble beginnings, an education to get them out of poverty, and giving back to the community has struck an enduring chord throughout all of my family's actions. I work now to not only to give our children the best education they can receive, but to give back to the community that has given so much to us. We know that we are nothing without

I remember 5 years ago, as I was planning to leave for yet another business trip where I volunteer for my profession, my then ten year-old daughter commented, "Why do you have to go to these meetings? Oh, I know. It's what we do." "Yes, baby," I replied. "It's what we do."

Thank you so much for the privilege of being on the stage here with so many incredible women, it is truly an honor.

In Memoriam

It is with a heavy heart that we announce that we've lost another treasured member of our community.

Dr. Kathy C Hsi, wife of Past Chapter President Dr. David Hsi.

Kathy departed this life peacefully on January 17, 2025, leaving behind a legacy of kindness, strength, and unyielding compassion that touched every life she encountered.

Born in 1927 in Shanghai, China, over her 97 years, Kathy witnessed major events in the history of China and, after immigrating to the US in 1949, profound changes in US society. She completed a Masters of Science at the University of Minnesota in mathematics. There she met her lifelong love, David, in a chance encounter when she performed at a piano concert. They married in 1952, eventually moving to Clovis, New Mexico. She taught math at Gattis Junior High and Clovis High School for 17 years. She loved her students and particularly sought to support young women who worked hard to learn math. They remember her dedication and teaching skills. At age 60, she set an example for the whole family about life-long learning by completing her PhD in statistics at the University of New Mexico.

She will be remembered for her hospitality, caring nature, keen intellect, resilience, unforgettable laugh, her love of her family, cooking, music, reading and learning. A devout Christian and member of First Presbyterian Church in Albuquerque, she now passes to the kingdom of heaven to be re-united with her son, Steven. She is survived by husband of 72 years, David, her son Andy, her daughter-in-laws Kristin and Beth, her grandchildren Anders, Andy, David and Kiersta and their spouses, and her 6 great-grandchildren who she told the world were "so cute."

A memorial service to celebrate Kathy's remarkable life will be held at 11AM on March 22, 2025 at the First Presbyterian Church of Albuquerque, 215 Locust Street NE.
